Prior to coming to Seton Hall, Bryan spent 18 years at the Legal Aid Society in New York City where he worked in the Society's Criminal Defense Division, Criminal Appeals Bureau, and Immigration Law Unit, specializing in the representation of non-citizens facing deportation because of criminal convictions.
